It's hard to find even one instance where hasn't added value or been a key factor in the successful outcome of a trainex, incident or meeting. His influence and drive in pulling together the training exercises, which are seen as highly successful by all involved and crucial to preparing crews for incidents, is a shining example of dedication and organisation. The recent trainex was organised and coordinated by and focused on mass rescue _ where multiple casualties from a simulated vessel collision needed locating and rescue. Given that mass rescue is a big focus of Coastguard in light of several ferry incidents (Fullers Jet Raider ferry engine fire in January, White Island Ferry fire in late 2015), it's appropriate that was pulling this vital exercise together. All this is on top of his active incident activities and Instructor work.
