Words that rang true - thanks to you!



"A donation, no matter how small or large, will help to keep Coastguard on the water in the future. Who knows, you might need them one day" – a message from Debbie, whose husband Robin was rescued by Coastguard.

Debbie is one of our amazing Team Rescue supporters and gives a monthly donation to Coastguard. Her husband Robin has a real passion for boats, and living in Bucklands Beach, they've watched many boats being rescued by Coastguard.

Little did they know that one day in March it would be Robin that needed urgent help. Lying flat on his back, vomiting from the pain, he was praying help wouldn't be far away.

Robin and his mate Anton had headed off to Tairua to try their luck catching some fish. They'd checked the weather forecast and logged a trip report with Coastguard. The Tairua - Pauanui bar has claimed lives before and can be unpredictable but Robin and Anton were experienced and well-prepared. At 7.45am they decided it was time to cross. Taking the waves head on, their boat rocked and leaned as the sea got more and more choppy. The final wave tossed their boat a terrifying two metres into the air.

Robin, a Quantity Surveyor, could see they were in real danger. He shouted to his mate: "Don't turn around or stop!" They had to get through the churning waves.


Suddenly the boat rocked violently again – Robin lost his grip and was thrown out of his seat. The boat landed hard with Robin taking the full impact on his back as he fell onto the boat floor.

"I took a survey of the boat to make sure we were still floating and we weren't taking on any water," recalled Robin. Badly injured and in excruciating pain, Robin lay on the floor of the boat telling Anton to head to the nearest island, and calmer waters.

Once anchored, there was nothing they could do but call

Coastguard for help. Robin knew he was in bad shape and in desperate need of medical attention. Later in hospital he'd find out that he'd have a long road to recovery with a fractured back. They were both in sheer shock of what had just happened. But they managed to stay calm knowing help was on its way.

"The words I remember hearing was 'Hi guys, you are safe now!' I felt the helplessness lift off my shoulders," recalled Robin, remembering the Coastguard boat pulling up beside them. "They were so calm, and knew exactly what to do. We both felt safe and relieved."

Because of you and your donations Robin and his mate Anton were rescued. You made sure Coastguard volunteers could save them. Thank you.

Still recovering from his injuries, Robin took Debbie to a Coastguard seminar on Bar Crossings. These events are provided for free to help boaties cross bars safely, and are made possible by your amazing support.

Rod Frost, Coastguard Volunteer

Your donations help save lives in many ways. Whether it's giving advice at the boat ramp or encouraging people to call for help, it's all in a day's mahi for **Coastguard volunteer Rod Frost. In his** own words, read about Rod's experiences as a Coastquard volunteer.

"Let me tell you about the different people we help...

"Close to home around Papakura (Bottle Top Bay) area we help people in small boats, kayaks, and land-based fishing for food. For these people, no fish means no meat to go with their meals. For them the cost of a lifejacket is a big deal, their boats are old and often not in good repair. So, we work hard to help educate and encourage them to do the right thing.

"We encourage them to call for help when something starts to go wrong, don't wait til it gets worse or dark.

"Then for our general Manukau Harbour users the challenge comes when stories of big and abundant fish cause them to start looking to the West Coast. We are often asked at the boat ramps about the West Coast and

crossing. We try to share some facts about crossing the bar - respect the bar, go with someone else for a time or two and make sure to do trip reports.

"Just recently we assisted a family's boat that had got into trouble on the bar. It was full of water and everything was wet. We were able to get the two

> jackets and take them out of that frightening experience. They were quiet at first but soon relaxed and started to tell us about their ordeal. They had woken up in the middle of the night to see water all around them and the kitchen table floating. We escorted them home. The pager had gone off about 3am and it was now about 10:30am on a workday.

"Over the years we have had a number of high-profile rescues and some very lucky people have lived against the odds. But for me, I think every job is special. Just getting out there and helping someone whose plans have not gone to plan and getting them back to land or even just a jump start, gives a sense of purpose. No one goes out to get into trouble. You can't just get out and walk home."


### **WE NEED 240 NEW** COASTGUARD VOLUNTEERS.
